Anna's mom is now Pandora Brooke and is living in Beaumont TX. Her dad is in Snellville GA. Anna is living in Beaumont TX. After ten years in FL, hurricane Charlie and the humidity ("the two H's"") chased them out to look for dry country that was found in the desert of NM (Las Cruces) where they are now. Alice is doing artistic work with oils on canvas and is a recognized local artist, having displayed art works in several galleries in NM, and is on permanent display in the Dona Ana County building as well as the Cities Cultural Art Center. She loves to do large canvas work which goes well with the high ceilinged homes in the territory. Cliff has a small work center to fabricate the museum wrap frames, stretch canvas and other finished frames for normal size canvas. They found the Colony a sad appearance with overgrown plants and homes worn by the inclement weather over all these years but the church stands proudly and still looks beautiful. On another cruise through the Panama Canal 3 years ago Katy again picked them up and had the key to the church; they walked the aisle to the alter where they embraced as they had 38 years earlier. They have fond memories of Aruba and say it was nice to again feel the freshness of the air, have lunch at the Talk of the Town and see the many new stores, hotels, Island improvements and to be with Katy and Alby. Cliff went to Aruba in 1966 as the supplier of valve actuators from Ledeen in CA for the refinery automation project. Alice went as a teacher in 1967; they were married in 1971 with a Civil service in Orangestaad and a wedding book that could record 13 children (a new book free if filled which made the Terry's wonder about Hugh Gums at the Strand); the Lago church was filled and people peered through the windows from outside. At the reception at the "club" they opened an extra room for a display of the gifts. Brenda McCarthy and Katy Boeke were bridesmaids and Errol Bardoulie, a Lago engineer, was best man.

Malcolm says this is (or was) a well-known brand and he believes she was correct. His 2004 Thomas Register of American Manufacturers does not show a listing for them, so they may have gone out of business or been absorbed into another company. He isn't sure what furniture was provided for the 1500 houses but for the older houses, the maple furniture came from the Thomas Beals Furniture Company in Portland ME. They are also not in the 2004 register. He knows they were still in business in 1973 when he corresponded with them, trying unsuccessfully to get a replacement part for one of their chairs.

Betsy Frazier [52-65] shares some Christmas nostalgia in old Lago Colony ... "Christmas in foreign countries, wherever you are from originally, is always a bit different. Lago went all out to encourage the seasonal spirit and as an example decorated the catalytic cracking unit with strings of colored lights, topping it with a 20 foot revolving star. The result, at least at night, looked like a gigantic 16 story Christmas tree. In September we signed up for cut trees and they came from the States as deck cargo on a tanker in mid December. The first few years we were there, a truck came by delivering them and it was sort of pot luck. You could take what was handed you, or perhaps could look at the top two or three, but you couldn't expect them to unload the whole truck for your choice. In later years they were piled on the dance floor at the Esso Club or at the tennnis court. This gave a better opportunity to make a selection, but it was something of a mob scene when the doors opened. Most people enjoyed their turkey dinner on Christmas Eve and many went to the Community Church afterwards. There was a living tableau on the Church lawn. One Christmas the sheep got loose and the pastor spent a strenuous morning trying to round up his flock. Christmas Day was for calling on friends and so was Boxing Day. If you didn't find them home one day, try the next. There were many Christmas parties. Santa Claus came to the preschool children's party at the club, and later visited the hospital patients. As we had a convertible it was my pleasant task for several years to drive this celebrity through the colony waving as we went, and then accompany him through the hospital. There was always an excellent Christmas choir concert directed by Doris Thompson [51-77] which frequently involved over a hundred voices, a high point of the season. After many Christmases in many countries, I still look back on those as the happiest.

Anna (Tinkle) Silverstein writes with pride about her father. "Aruba was a very beautiful and magical place for me as a teenager. My dad and I still talk about Aruba often. I have many photos of the addition of the desulfurization unit and hydrodesulfurization unit to Lago built between 1968 and June of 1971. My father, James Edward Tinkle (Ed), worked for Parsons Corporation at Esso Oil Company and Lago Oil and Transport Refinery from February 1970 through May 1971. This is when the desulfurization or extraction of sulfur from crude oil was begun. This process was started to remove the sulfur from crude oil due to the problem of smog in big cities. Without sulfur, the fuel oil, kerosene, diesel fuel, and gasoline would produce a cleaner product, plus the sulfur could be sold as a commodity. My father was hired as a material engineer. When he arrived in Aruba, the job had been going on for six months and was only 10% complete. The job was waiting for a person who knew how to receive the necessary material. There was just one warehouse 20' x 40' and 14 people, including 6 office workers, the field buyer, and the office manager, and 8 warehouse workers. All of the small fittings and dry insulation were stored in the warehouse, plus the first aid station with a full time nurse. Before he left, that had grown to four warehouses with a total of 60 workers. The 20' x 40' warehouse was increased to a 40' x 80' with an office 20' x 40' inside the warehouse, plus a receiving office where materials were received and dispersed. The second warehouse was a tool room, the third was dry storage that housed 1,000 bags of cement for fire proofing and foundations, and the fourth warehouse was used for the hydrodesulfurization (HDS) plant being built at the same time as the desulfurization unit. Sand and gravel had to be barged in from Venezuela because the sand on Aruba came from coral and wasn't suitable for mixing with cement. There was also a 3 acre pipe yard called the lay down yard. The inventory there included small, medium and big bore pipe, over 1,000 pieces; all types of valves and fittings; hundreds of pieces stacked like bananas on pallets; everything needed to build a plant. When my dad left Aruba in May 1971, the plant was 60% complete and was not yet making the desired product, sulfur, in full production. I was in Aruba the summer of 1970 and from January to May of 1971. I was too old to attend the school in the colony, which, I believe, at that time was 1st through 8th grades. Many of the teenagers went away to private schools, however, I and a few others took correspondence courses."

Dottie (Rynalski) Manser ('45[32-41] still enjoys the Chronicle, although she doesn't recognize many names any more. She especially liked the recent article on Papiamentu.

Shirley (Hewlett) Barton ('54) is still in San Antonio TX but with much of her growing family in MI a move is tempting. She has 3 sons and their wives, 5 grands and 3 great grands plus the in-laws that go with them.

What does [__-_] after a person's name mean? In order to help identify folks we include the years they were in Aruba in brackets in the news articles; for the 'kids' we give the class they belonged to in parentheses. If you see [__-_] it means we need help! It is our desire to eventually have the name of everyone who lived in Lago Colony and the years they were there. Lots of you are mentioned in this issue with the [_-_].

David Sorensen ('72)[57-64] held his special exhibition of "The Sorensen Collection: A Personal Journey Through Art" at the Charles H. Taylor Arts Center, in Hampton VA on September 3 - Oct 16. The exhibition was a personal look at over 40 years of his own artwork and his family collection of international art. It included approximately 500 works -- paintings, drawings, graphics, sculpture, ceramics, crafts, and photographs across a spectrum of realistic, contemporary, and indigenous genre. The show focused on Dave's connections with the Caribbean (Aruba and Curacao), his ancestral roots and close friendships with Danish artists, his love for the Australian outback, various artistic family members, and his recent life in Hampton Roads. It was named one of the "Top 10 Visual Arts" events by Veer Magazine. Over 40 works related to the Netherlands and Netherlands Antilles were on display to include works by former Lago residents Paul G. Sorensen [57-64], John Stritch [___], Dodie Finlayson [___], and Bob Dorwart [[30-32][37-64]. Dave's sister Lisa, who was born on Aruba, is a professional photographer and several of her photos were included as well. The show premiered several original illustrations from Dave's unpublished children's book, "The Long White Staircase" (by the Lago tennis courts). The Dutch Embassy was invited and Ms. Jocelyne Croes, Minister Plenipotentiary for Aruba in the US, had originally hoped to attend. Several Lagoites were part of the 1600+ visitors, including Jacques van Montfrans ('62) and Hans Wagemaker ('66).

It's always good to hear from <u>Penny Stout</u> [40-45]. The daughter of <u>Bill</u> [36-45] and <u>Kay</u> [37-45] <u>Stout</u>, Penny left Aruba as a very young child but has remained a faithful contributor to the Chronicle. Her folks both died in 1989.

Dufi Kock and the rest of Aruba are very proud of Dr Edward Cheung who played a role in the historic last launching this year of the Space Shuttle Atlantis. Dr. Cheung was decorated with the highest rank this year by Queen Beatrix of the Netherlands. He was born in Aruba of Chinese parents. He went to school in Aruba then completed his BS, Masters and Doctorate in Electrical Engineering. He is married to an Aruban and they have a daughter and a son. So, every time I see the 'new hotel' in any rendition it brings back memories of my beloved Dorothy, the first British baby born in Aruba and who was also fluent in Dutch as she lived in Holland for decades with the love of her life...I miss her."

Joe Shaver [49-62], San Antonio TX, retired from his 2nd career in November 2009 after 60 years in the work force: 34 with Exxon, 26 with his son, Neal, in Eurotex Diamond Corp. In 2008 he had successful colon cancer surgery but in December 2009 scar tissue blocked an intestine, so more surgery was necessary. He developed acute pneumonia and was unconscious for 3 weeks. The development of the huge resorts and casinos on the northwest Palm Beach region, ignoring the region around San Nicolas and Seroe Colorado is understandable, but to leave that part of the island so neglected needs to be addressed. The fact that the native culture of the island still exists in San Nicolas is a very marketable tourist product (including Charlie's Bar). I recommend that we should all wear the Esso T shirt that was produced by Terry Schroth ('83), as wearing it I found that locals were impressed that I was of the Esso Era, and it encouraged locals to talk to me. Carol Francis (from whom I rented a guest apartment near Oranjestad) shared with me a large property her family owns in San Nicolas that would make a great B&B or tourist apartments. Bearing in mind that Baby Beach is one of the best marketed tourist destinations, and worthy of being so, I am surprised entrepreneurs have not developed associated accommodation and activities, taking advantage of this unique area. When Holland was overrun by the Wehrmacht in 1940, Dad said Dutch police rounded up all Germans for deportation to a camp in Bonaire, but Frank Griffin heard about it in time to tell Dr. Sandvoss to rush to the Esso Aruba which was in harbor preparing to sail for N.Y.. Dr. and Mrs. Sandvoss and two boys, Rolf and Bert, went to N.Y. where the Dr. took up the practice of medicine. They lived in Westhchester and later summered in Maine. In about 1975 I was working at U.S. Trust in N.Y. and was introduced to a new hire, Rolf Sandvoss! He said things worked out okay for his family during the War, and everyone became U.S. citizens. On Ancestry.com I found ship records and even Mrs. Sandvoss's Maine obituary, telling how Dr. S. was born in Fürth, Bavaria, in 1899, was in the Bavarian artillery in WWI, then went to Geneva where Mrs. Sandvoss, a native of Geneva, was a medical student.
