Confidentiality is a concern. Please remember that this site is for the Chronicle only and only those on the Lago Bulletin Board or who sent your e-mail address to Ginger Bassett should have access to it. That means <u>not</u> sharing the site access information with friends or family, including Lagoites, and never using Chronicle information for commercial purposes.

If you aren't on Larry's Lago Bulletin Board and want to be, send him your e-mail address (<u>RiggsLarry@aol.com</u>). Otherwise, if you want access to the web site, send your e-mail address to <u>gingerbassett@comcast.net</u> (the only use will be to send the access code for a new issue or to contact you for Chronicle business such as researching 'missing' folks.

For those wishing to continue receiving the Chronicle via the postal service, a \$10 annual donation would be appreciated to cover printing and postal costs.

There are some drawbacks to this system. It is actually harder for your Chronicle staff. A lot of effort has gone into finding 'missing' Lagoites and the USPS has been a big help with forwarding addresses and death notices. People change email addresses far more frequently than snail mail addresses and e-mail does not provide forwarding addresses. Street cars in Aruba! Nassaustraat was totally torn up during the reunion as preparations for street cars were being made. The streetcar is one of the key projects in the revitalization of the island's capital. There will be 3 streetcars, each carrying up to 70 passengers; they'll stop about every 8 minutes at 8 different stops in Oranjestad. The turnaround points are the cruise terminal in Oranjestad, and the far end of Nassaustraat. The streetcars will work on rechargeable batteries, avoiding the need of above ground wires. Aruba's green streetcar rail system fits the government vision to have the island fully dependent on green energy in the future. One stop is anticipated to be at a parking garage to be built behind the bus terminal which will help both locals and tourists. It is hoped the streetcar will also help the merchants along Nassaustraat who have suffered from all the buildup closer to the port. The streetcar in Aruba is unique in the Caribbean, and is hoped to be operational soon. The renovation and upgrade of the Main Street in Oranjestad is scheduled to be completed at the same time.

Duane and Mary Huetter [69-71] spent a day in Aruba in Nov 2009 while on a cruise. The complete change of vegetation in the colony area, changes in the shore line at Baby Lagoon and grass golf courses were most interesting to them. A memorial service was held in Madison Heights VA.

The following is from <u>Patsy Engelking</u>, widow of <u>Larry</u> <u>Engelking</u> who was with Lago from 1941 to 1952.

Leo Baldwin, a young kid in 1929, was attending the U of WY when his roommate received a letter from an older brother urging him to apply for work in the newly built refinery in Aruba. The roommate wasn't interested but Leo was. He researched everything he could about Aruba; it was one of the ABC islands, under Dutch rule, in the Caribbean between Trinidad and the Panama Canal, just off the coast of Venezuela. This was about all he could find out. It was enough to wet his appetite and he thrilled to the idea of an adventure. He applied for work in Aruba. There was one holdback. The love of his life, Harriett Raymond, lived across the WY/CO State line in the promising small town of Wellington, just 9 miles north of Fort Collins. Leo had come in from the prairies and lived in the Raymond home so he could attend high school. With the pending adventure he and Harriett decided to elope. Employees went to Aruba by ship since air travel was not available at the time. There were other employees being hired from the oil refining area around Casper. Leo first lived in the bachelor quarters. When housing became available Harriett joined him in Bung #136, a 3-room bungalow built on "Bird Cage Row". While living in the BQ and learning to be an operator on one of the Units, Leo realized that the employees had no reading materials. He got permission to bring the weekly TIME magazine down on the company tankers .He told me that he sat on a bench in the dining hall with these magazines on the bench beside him and sold them to the fellows who were very eager to catch up on the 'news of the day' even if it was a week old - the beginning of the Magazine Business which Leo and Harriett Baldwin ran until August 1942. It's hard to believe in the information age we live in today that these TIME magazines, already at least a week old, were one of the few sources of "News" available in 1929. Short wave radio was not very reliable and in short supply. Leo's brother, Paul Baldwin, and his wife Louise came to work and live in Aruba. Harriett came back to the states when her father died the summer of 1941. I had finished high school in Wellington in the spring of 1940 and had attended Occidental College in Pasadena CA. Harriett invited me to come back to Aruba with her. She said she had not felt well and I could work in the Magazine business and relieve her. I recall she said the experience would be the equivalent of another year of college. It certainly was that and more. It was such a rich experience and changed my life. I was not looking for a husband but I found one! These were the war years, when the submarine warfare really crippled the export of crude oil to the refinery in Aruba and the export of high octane gasoline around the world to fuel the allied aircraft. I was awakened the night of February 16, 1942 when a German submarine fired on the Lake Tankers waiting to unload crude oil from Lake Maracaibo. I watched the tankers as they became engulfed with burning oil and I could hear the bells of alarm from the

decks of the ships. Then I watched the shots going into the air in the direction of the refinery. I felt we were under attack. I was aware that folks left all the lights on in their houses and outside on their patios. I quickly dressed and ran from house to house in my neighborhood waking people to tell them we were under attack. I was surprised to find the young Dutch Doctor and his wife sitting in lawn chairs on their patio as if watching a movie as they watched the tankers surrounded by burning oil. There have been other reports from folks who lived through these times. We were busy complying with the orders for black out. I remember we had to paint the headlights of our autos black and then scrape off a two centimeter strip. The window louvers had to be painted black with no light leaking out and we were given black cloth to cover frames to make a double entry so that we didn't open a door and let the light be seen. In those days most of us smoked cigarettes. We were warned to not light a match for it could be seen for seven miles out to sea. The white tanks holding refined oil were also visible for miles; they were painted black. We felt very vulnerable and we were. We didn't know then that Hitler did not want the refinery destroyed but hoped to capture it for his own use. His submarine warfare seemed very successful as the subs picked off the ships, loaded with high octane fuel for the Allied aircraft, after they left the deep harbor in Aruba. I recall seeing the red glow of burning ships on the horizon. I remember Capt. Hargrail from the Lake tanker fleet who used to visit with me at the Esso Club where I took care of the Magazine business and the lending library. He had said that he was too old to handle the stress and had decided to retire and was waiting for a ship to take him back to his homeland of England. His ship came in and they joined a convoy of ships leaving the Island of Trinidad. A pack of submarines attacked the convoy and his ship was sunk. At Christmas break from her teaching job in Wheatland WY, Harriett's sister, Peggy Raymond, came to Aruba to visit and applied for a teaching position for the following school year of 1933. She met and married Calvin Kratz. Calvin had worked as a stockbroker on Wall Street until the stock market crash of 1929. He was hired in the accounting department in Aruba. Cal was a very charming and outgoing person. When he married Peggy he took her name, becoming Cal Raymond. They had 2 children: Kaye, born in Aruba in 1934 or 35, and Jack, born in CO in 1937. In the summer of 1941, following the death of their beloved father Peggy, her children and her sister Harriett came back to the States, Because of the war in Europe and Aruba being a Dutch colony Peggy and Cal decided she and the 2 children should remain in the States until the war was over. As soon as the State Department would issue a passport for them, Peggy and the children returned to Aruba. This was in the early fall of 1943. They had been there for only a week when Cal became very ill. He complained of a very bad headache. Peggy called the hospital and they sent an ambulance. He walked to the ambulance but was unconscious when they reached the hospital. Cal never regained consciousness; the diagnosis was Spinal Meningitis. The family was hospitalized and kept under surveillance suspecting that they may have brought the infection with them. Peggy and the children were then flown back to the States as persons were allowed to stay only if a family member was an employee of the company. Cal's body was shipped by tanker in a hermetically sealed casket to Fort Collins CO where he is buried with others in the Raymond family. Harriett and I returned to the States in August 1942.
